Book Review

Sounds From Heaven

Look up Acts Chapter 2 verses 1 and 2 and you will recognize the source of the title for this book and get an impression of the theme of the subject matter – Revival. What a Revival it turned out to be, lasting from 1949 to 1952. The Lewis Awakening, as the Revival came to be called, centered in the beginning in the villages of Barvas and Shader, but spread to the other parishes on the island and into the Isle of Harris.

The Isle of Lewis, the most northerly island in the Outer Hebrides chain, off the West Coast of Scotland, experienced a major revival in the late 1930's to early 1940's. My memories of that Revival, the memories of a ten year old, were described in an article that appeared in the newsletter in either June or September 2002. The concluding paragraph of the article concludes:-

"In years following there were some who came to know the Lord as He had started the work of salvation in their heart at the revival of 1940. "Where the Lord starts the good work He will bring it to a conclusion". This was the background, no doubt, for the later revival in 1949. Maybe more about that at a later date

This book does a far better job of that follow-up than any article I could write. It is a heart warming, readable book and there is a copy in the Knox library for all to read.

The principal preacher and leader during this Revival was the Rev. Duncan Campbell, a Gaelic speaking Faith Mission worker. His reports to the Faith Mission headquarters in Edinburgh are given in the book. The booklet he wrote about this revival is a good introduction to "Sounds From Heaven". Talk to Murdo Smith if you would like a copy.

I know, knew and grew up with many of the people whose testimony is given in the book, so I may stand accused, tried, convicted and sentenced for being biased, but the truth still remains that it was a Revival that produced enduring results. Back-sliding did not occur.

The Isle of Lewis of fifty five years ago is well removed from the present day, non the less, the state of our society today and the church that bears the name of Jesus Christ should drive us to pray with the Psalmist:- "Will you not revive us again O Lord"

I hope this book prompts all its readers to pray that prayer and start another Revival.
